## STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The co-curricular activities of our school are as important as the inclass activities. Not only do they add to the fun of school and make classwork seem easier but they are the vital foundation of school spirit.

Co-curricular activities furnish us with an opportunity to practice responsible and successful adult living. The most important things we will learn in school are how to work well with other people; how to lead and how to follow; how to carry responsibility; and how to use initiative and mature judgment. These skills, together with the attitudes of alertness, cooperativeness, respect, and self-confidence, are the basis of happy and successful living. These are the traits that develop useful and deserving citizens of a democracy. No other part of our school life will give us as great an opportunity to develop these characteristics as will the co-curricular program of our school.

The EXECUTIVE BOARD is composed of the Student Body president; the girls' and boys' vice presidents; the secretary; the treasurer; the commissioners of entertainment, internal affairs, and public relations; the head song and yell leaders; and the appointive officers. This group of students works constantly for the welfare of the Student Body. They consider all matters and proposals before they are presented to the Student Council.

The STUDENT COUNCIL is composed of the elected representatives or alternate representatives of the 9th grade English, 10th grade English, 11th grade U. S. History, and 12th grade Civics and American Problems classes; the members of the Executive Board; and the representatives of such other groups and organizations as the Student Council may designate.

The STUDENT ACTIVITIES BOARD is composed of the Student Body president, the girls' and boys' vice presidents, the secretary, the treasurer, the Principal and Vice Principal, the Deans of Boys and Girls, and the Financial Secretary. The Board serves as a policy-making and administrative body for all school activities. Some of the Board functions are to:

- Review, revise, and approve all club, class, and activity budgets recommended by the Executive Board.
- Appropriate student body funds recommended by the Executive Board.
- Recommend contracting of school photographers, yearbook firms, class ring firms, etc.
- Make policies for governing of school activities.

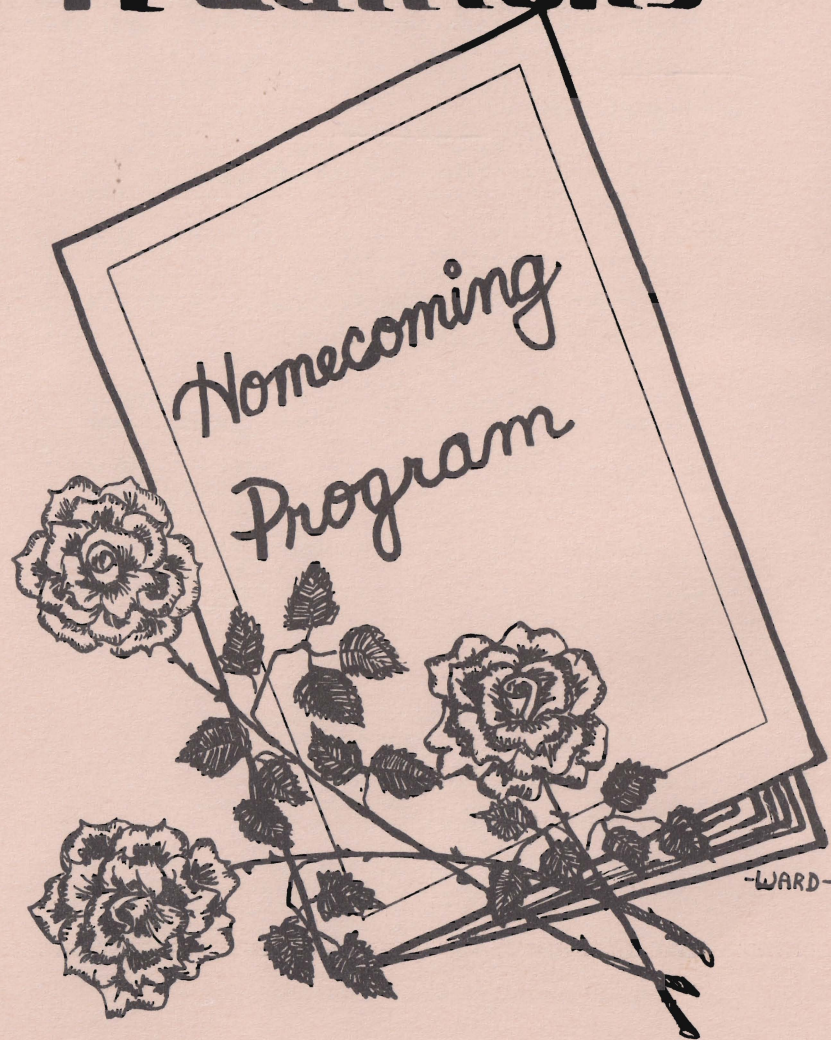
The procedure of ELECTING STUDENT BODY AND CLASS OFFICERS begins when a petition is obtained from the office. The petition must then be signed by 50 students. In the case of a class officer petition, only members of the class involved may sign. Voting for student body officers will be school wide, and class elections will involve each specific class only. To be eligible to run for a student body office, it is necessary to fulfill all qualifications and pass the constitution test.

# Traditions



## TRADITIONS

WEARING WHITE AND GREEN ON COLOR DAY. Pupils wear white and green on the day of an interscholastic game. The pupils attending the game who sit in the rooting section wear white. This uniform appearance of the students adds greatly to the enthusiasm and spirit of the team and spectators.

A GET ACQUAINTED DANCE is among the first activities of the school year and is usually scheduled following the first home football game. It is a social function designed principally to honor incoming freshmen and students new to El Camino.

HOMECOMING DAY is set aside to honor the alumni. Decoration of campus buildings, the coronation of a Homecoming Queen, a football game, and a dance are planned for the entertainment of alumni and students.

A CHRISTMAS PROGRAM is presented each year prior to Christmas vacation by the Fine Arts Department.

The ANNUAL CARNIVAL is an all-school activity. The clubs and organizations of El Camino High School sponsor booths according to a central theme agreed upon by the Student Council. Proceeds are shared by the Student Body and the individual groups participating.

A FASHION SHOW is sponsored annually by the Home Economics Department.

DONKEY BASKETBALL follows the end of the regular basketball season and features teams comprised of the faculty, the Eaglesmen, alumni, and the Block E.C. It is sponsored by the El Caminian in cooperation with the Student Body.

The FRESHMAN DANCE is the big social activity of the year for the freshmen.

The SOPHOMORE PICNIC is the annual spring activity for sophomores.

The JUNIOR PROM is the highlight of the social year for juniors.

The SENIOR PLAY is the annual dramatic production involving members of the Senior Class.

TWIRP SEASON, dedicated to the girls, consists of two days of activities in which the boys and girls switch roles. The girls carry books for the boys, etc. and date the boys for the Twirp Dance which climaxes the activities.

The VARIETY SHOW is sponsored by the Student Body. Auditions are held for the selection of participants for this all-school production.

The SPRING CONCERT features music by El Camino's excellent vocal and instrumental groups.



SENIOR TEACH DAY finds the seniors in the roles of teachers in many of the classes. This is a dress-up day for seniors, and the occasion is anticipated by all.

The SENIOR PICNIC DAY is planned as a part of senior activities to provide the seniors with an opportunity to relax and have fun before Baccalaureate and Commencement.

AUTOGRAPH NIGHT is sponsored by the Aerie Staff to give students time to sign each other's yearbooks. This affair is staged in one of the gymnasiums on the last Wednesday of the school year.

SENIOR AWARDS NIGHT is for the purpose of paying tribute to the outstanding El Camino High School senior students. Parents, friends and students are welcome to attend.

The SENIOR BALL is the last dance of the school year. It is designed to be the most elaborate and thrilling dance of the year.

## SERVICE

There are numerous opportunities for services to others that present themselves in our school. The individual who serves himself and the school constantly receives direct and indirect benefits--direct, from the satisfaction of serving his fellow man and in developing his character and leadership skills; indirect, from helping to make the atmosphere at El Camino more pleasant and more wholesome. No one can be considered an educated person until he is willing to help other people without being rewarded.

The purpose of the BIG BROTHER-BIG SISTER COMMITTEE is to assist Freshmen with their problems. New students above the freshman level will be assisted by the Friendship Committee. Upper classmen are assigned an incoming student so that they may show the campus to the student, explain the rules, acquaint him with the customs and traditions, and most important-- introduce him to others and ease that "lost" feeling.

The duties of the HALL MONITORS are to guide visitors, check passes during class hours, and maintain order in the halls. Monitors are chosen by the administration on the basis of tact, scholarship, citizenship, and responsibility. They deserve your respect and cooperation. Monitors may receive five units of school credit per semester.

Students may earn up to five units of service credit by working as an OFFICE ASSISTANT during one of the regular class periods. This credit counts toward graduation and the amount earned depends on the type of work and the number of periods taken. Some of the offices in which students may work are the attendance, counselors, deans, physical education, nurse, library, business, and audio-visual offices.

SILVER PAGES is a service organization of library assistants. Its programs are designed to further members' knowledge of library work and to assist in the operation of our school library. Silver Pages honors the faculty annually with two tea and coffee hours.

Our school is so large that some system is necessary to supervise the flow of students and automobiles and to regulate parking of automobiles for faculty, guests, and students. The OUTSIDE TRAFFIC PATROL OFFICERS will be students chosen from the ranks of the Cadet Corps and will be supervised by Major Armstrong.

The SERVICE PATROL functions under the constitution. It is our recognition of some of the responsibilities that accompany participation in school management. The purpose of the student patrol is to assist in the management of the cafeteria, at school dances, at games, and at all school affairs. This patrol is our organization. Support it and make it work by obeying its rules and program prepared through the student council. If you are chosen as a patrol officer, you should feel honored, because this is a position of trust, leadership, and responsibility.

The HONOR SERVICE CLUB is an organization of students elected on the basis of high scholarship, citizenship and the desire to serve El Camino High School. Members are given the responsibility of assisting new students, handling tickets at games and other functions, acting as campus guides, etc. Students may sign up with the Honor Service Club chairman through the office of the Dean of Boys.



## SCHOOL CLUBS

The BLOCK E.C. is open to any boy who has earned a junior or varsity block letter. It is a club for both fun and service. Only students who have earned a Block E.C. are permitted to wear a block letter. The members of the Block E.C. sell popcorn at all major athletic events to provide income for the club.

The FUTURE BUSINESS LEADERS OF AMERICA has been organized to give students an insight into the workings of modern-day businesses. It is designed to help prepare those who are interested in a future business career.

The FUTURE HOMEMAKERS OF AMERICA enjoys such activities as swimming parties and interesting meetings. Girls seeking similar goals plan their futures and learn about such vocations as interior decoration, T.V. demonstrations, retail merchandising, teaching, and marriage!

The FUTURE MEDICS OF AMERICA is planned to interest the boys and girls interested in a career in medicine. Films, trips, and guest speakers are always on the agenda.

If a future in teaching appeals to you, then you are sure to enjoy the FUTURE TEACHERS OF AMERICA club group. Preparations and further education on the subject is the club's main purpose.

KEY CLUB is sponsored by the Suburban Kiwanis and seeks to carry out the ideals of the Kiwanis International. It provides service for the school and community. It encourages initiative, good citizenship, and leadership on the part of its members.

The GIRLS' ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION has as its purpose the development of an interest in sports and the promotion of good sportsmanship among the girls at El Camino. Any girl who wishes to compete in sports is eligible. Points are given for participation in tournaments and games, holding office, and working on committees. G.A.A. awards for points are as follows:

100 points -- shield  
250 points -- block  
350 points -- pin  
500 points -- guard

The LATIN CLUB furthers the knowledge of Roman culture and living habits to its members. The annual Roman Banquet is the biggest club activity. It initiates and accepts new members at the annual banquet.

The purpose of the MATH CLUB is to show the relation of mathematics to some of the various vocations and to help create more interest and understanding of mathematics in general. This is accomplished through the use of movies, solving mathematical puzzles, and projects and speakers from related fields. The Math Club sponsors the National Mathematics Contest.

MODELING CLUB was organized to teach the modeling profession to interested girls. Participation in "fashion shows" highlights club activities.

SHAKESPEARE'S CREW works for the advancement of dramatics and provides interesting social activities for those interested in drama.

The SPEAKERS' CLUB has been organized to give interested students an opportunity to speak, and an opportunity to gather and discuss public speaking. Experience in speaking is a feature of the agenda of this club.

## HONOR CLUBS

CALIFORNIA SCHOLARSHIP FEDERATION is a state organization open to all students who have earned ten grade points or better during the previous semester.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY is open to any student who is invited to join because of scholarship, integrity, honesty, and honor. Once a student has joined, he is a permanent member unless unsatisfactory conduct forces his expulsion.

HONOR PEP CLUB is composed of fifty members (boys and girls) who are chosen by the sponsors and past officers of Honor Pep Club and Rally Committee. Selection is based upon application and all members work for points which help them obtain a future position on the Rally Committee. The group appears at all athletic events and assists with card tricks and the rooting section.

NATIONAL THESPIANS is an honor society for dramatic students. Students are chosen because of their outstanding achievement in the field of dramatics.

LOS HIDALGOS is a Spanish honor society for high school students who earn exceptional scholastic grades while enrolled in Spanish classes.

MU ALPHA THETA is a national mathematics honor club organized to further interest in mathematics and to encourage the development of sound scholarship as well as enjoyment of the subject. Students eligible for membership must have completed four semesters of college preparatory mathematics with a B average and be enrolled in a fifth semester.

QUILL & SCROLL is an international honor society for high school journalism students. If a student has a specific number of inches of print in the El Caminian and his material is accepted by the society, he is eligible for membership. Other outstanding publications work may qualify a person for membership.

## COMMITTEES

The ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE plans the programs for all assemblies. It writes and edits the scripts for the assemblies, subject to the approval of the faculty advisor. Membership is determined by sign-up application through the Commissioner of Entertainment.

Assemblies and rallies are held in the Boys' Gym under the supervision of the Commissioner of Entertainment. A schedule of regular assemblies is drawn up in September and the various clubs, classes, and organizations may be asked to sponsor an assembly.

The DANCE COMMITTEE publicizes, decorates, and takes care of the many arrangements for student body sponsored dances. Membership is determined by sign-up application through the Dance Committee Chairman.



The PUBLICITY COMMITTEE handles the advertising and publicity for all student body sponsored activities. Membership is determined by application through the Commissioner of Public Relations.

The RALLY COMMITTEE is composed of twenty members (girls and boys) who are chosen on the basis of points earned in the Honor Pep Club and other qualifications. The group appears at all major athletic events and assists with the card tricks, the rooting section, and stimulates and encourages school spirit at all times.

MAJORETTES march with the band at all football and basketball games and parades. Permission must be obtained from the Drill Team advisor to try out for Majorettes.

#### ACTIVITY SPONSORSHIP

All school functions shall be held on the school campus unless special permission is given by the Principal.

Teachers and staff members responsible for sponsoring student groups shall refuse requests for pupils to appear or perform at any activity where liquor is sold or its use is sanctioned and not prohibited.

The Vice Principal shall schedule all co-curricular and field trip activities with teachers, pupils and clubs.

No club or activity meetings are to be held without the presence of the sponsor.

No school parties, picnics, dances, banquets, etc. except those in connection with the Senior Class shall be scheduled after May 27.

School assemblies and rallies should be limited or not held from May 1 to the end of the year. This time is reserved for student body elections and campaigns.

Not more than one school banquet shall be scheduled during any one week and then on Friday night if possible. Consequently, pupil leaders and sponsors should plan such activities well in advance. School banquets will be held in the El Camino High School cafeteria and prepared and served by the El Camino cafeteria staff.

No activity money shall be used for gifts to teachers or individuals. The practice of collecting money by club, or class representatives, or teachers, for gifts to pupils or teachers is not a good policy and should be discouraged by teachers and pupil leaders.

Pupils on athletic trips, field trips, music festival trips, and other similar excursions shall be transported by such means and under such conditions as are approved by the Principal. When such trips are made in cars or buses, pupils shall be accompanied by a responsible adult in each vehicle.

When a dance following a game, or planned as a separate activity, is scheduled, a specific number of faculty sponsors should be on hand. A list of such sponsors is in the possession of the Dean of Girls and should be referred to in order to secure such sponsors.

#### AWARDS

A number of awards are given each year in recognition of extraordinary achievement in the various phases of school life. Many of these will be presented at a special awards assembly or at the Senior Night ceremonies at the end of the year. The following achievements merit awards:

1. It is an honor to be selected as STUDENT OF THE WEEK and to be honored at the Lion's Club dinner that week. It is recognition of accomplishment or service.
2. It is an honor to make the A or B HONOR ROLL each grading period.
3. Athletic awards are given out at the end of the sports season.  
An award will be given to an outstanding senior athlete with high scholastic standing as well as service in varied sports.
4. Certificates and/or special awards for school service go to:
  - a. Student Body officers
  - b. Class officers
  - c. Student Council members
  - d. Yell Leaders
  - e. Song Leaders
  - f. Musicians
  - g. Others who have rendered outstanding service
5. Honor Societies
6. Scholarship recipients
7. The EAGLE AWARD is given to students, other than student body officers, who have rendered outstanding service to school and community.

#### BLOCK AWARD SYSTEM

Size of blocks: (A certificate will be given with each of these blocks)

1. Varsity, 7" block EC (chenille)
2. B team and sophomore football, 5" block EC (chenille)
3. C team, 3" block EC (chenille)
4. J.V. and Reserve teams, felt circle EC
5. Frosh, numerals for year of graduation (chenille)

Ownership of block letter:

1. Only one block letter will be awarded each athlete. An appropriate certificate will be awarded in lieu of other blocks earned.
2. The block EC is the property of the student body until the holder graduates or moves from El Camino High School.
3. The block EC can be recalled from the holder at any time prior to graduation or moving from the school by the Athletic Advisory Board and for the following reasons:
  - a. Flagrant disregard for training rules
  - b. Conduct unbecoming a representative of El Camino High School



## MUSIC

The A CAPPELLA CHOIR is open to both boys and girls. An audition must first be obtained from the instructor; if successful, the candidate is asked to join the choir.

BOYS' GLEE and GIRLS' GLEE are open to boys and girls who successfully pass a screening test given by the music instructor.

JUNIOR BAND is composed of beginners in music who wish experience and plan to join the Senior Band at a later date.

The ORCHESTRA and STRING ENSEMBLE are open to all students who have advanced musical training and qualify after a tryout.

The PEP BAND provides music for the rallies and all school athletic events. It is open to students with advanced musical training who are willing to spend extra hours in practicing and performing at rallies, games, etc.

SENIOR BAND is open to all students who have had advanced instrumental music training.

## CADETS

El Camino High School's cadet program is open to all boys who wish to take military training. It is a state and local organization and fulfills the physical education requirements. The Cadet Corps furnishes the color guard for assemblies and major events. Several activities include the Military Ball and formal review each year. Cadets are eligible to qualify for the rifle teams and a block E.C. is awarded to team members. Major Thomas Armstrong directs the cadet program.

## PUBLICATIONS

The Aerie is the yearbook of El Camino High School. The staff is selected from a list of applicants by the outgoing staff with the approval of the advisor and the administration.

The El Caminian is the student newspaper of El Camino High School and serves as the voice of the students. It is written and edited by a staff of students selected by the previous staff with the approval of the advisor and the administration.

Applicants for positions on the Aerie and El Caminian staffs are screened on the basis of scholarship, citizenship, and previous experience with aptitude for journalistic activities.

The Student Directory contains the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of each student at El Camino. It is compiled and published annually by the Key Club and is sold at a nominal price.

The Student Handbook is compiled by a committee composed of students from the publicity committee and publications staffs working with the administration. Its purpose is to assist new students in learning about our school and to keep the El Camino High School Student Body informed.

### Miscellaneous publications information:

1. All news releases, radio programs, public speeches concerning the school, forums, plans for exhibitions, school programs, and other methods of disseminating information from the school should be cleared through the Principal's office.
2. The Principal may organize a public relations committee composed of staff members or pupils, or both, to carry out the functions and purposes of the public relations program of El Camino High School.

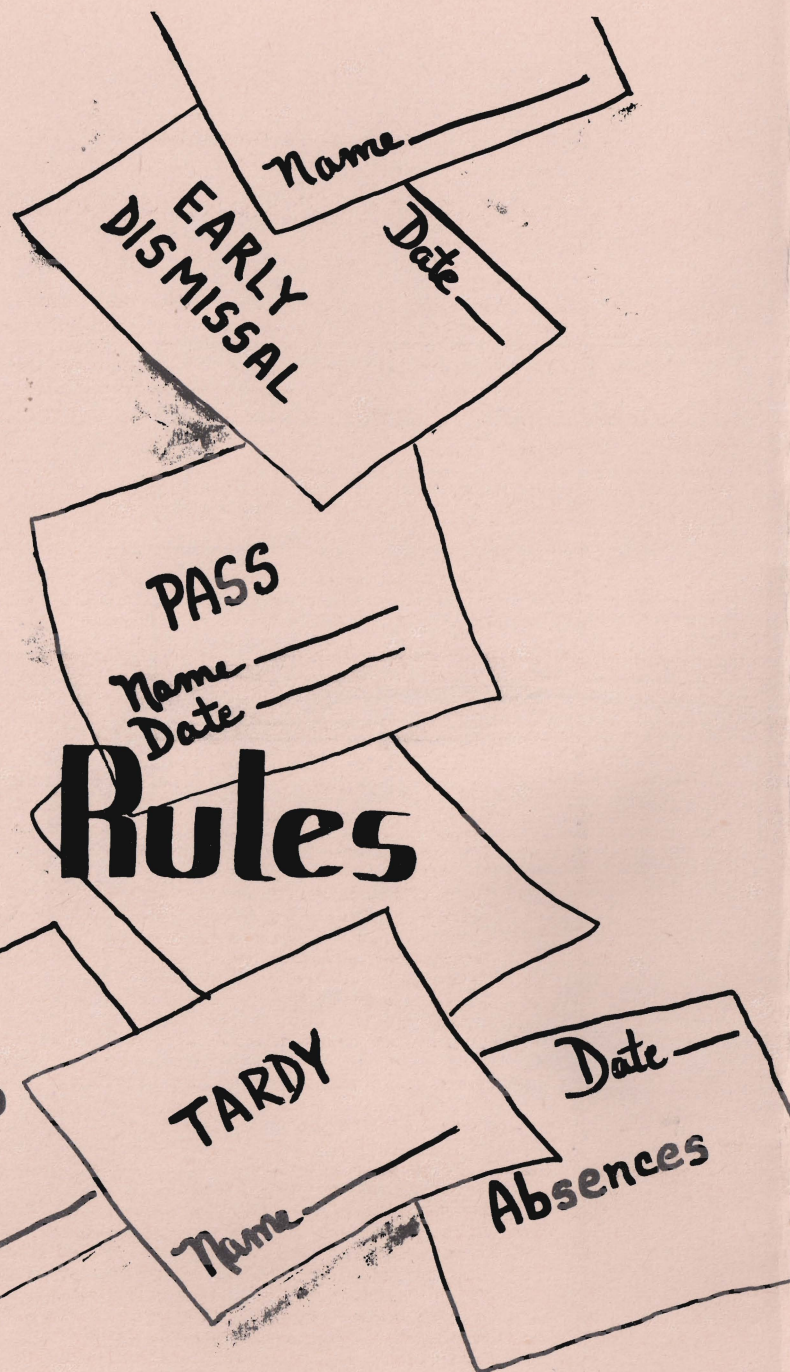

## GRADING SYSTEM

Our grading system is on a five point scale which is as follows:

- Grade A - Superior
- Grade B - Good
- Grade C - Average
- Grade D - Passing
- Grade F - Unsatisfactory (No credit given)

The standards set for the five point scale vary somewhat from department to department and from teacher to teacher. However, the interpretation of the above grading scale may be helpful to pupils and teachers in determining grade value. Generally, the various grades may be interpreted as follows for a pupil competing with himself for an academic grade.

A Grade - Superior. The pupil:

- a. Works up to a high level of achievement
- b. Completes assignments on time
- c. Is regular in attendance
- d. Reads critically
- e. Shows initiative and research in creative study
- f. Makes valuable contributions to class discussions
- g. Applies facts and principles to new situations
- h. Shows superior achievement on tests
- i. Shows evidence of outstanding preparation
- j. Does more work than is expected of the average or good student
- k. Meets requirements for B or C grades in addition to above

B Grade - Better than average. The pupil:

- a. Works up to a level of achievement above average
- b. Takes pride in doing good work
- c. Is regular in attendance
- d. Reads with comprehension above average
- e. Expresses ideas clearly and in good English when speaking and writing
- f. Learns thoroughly all the essential facts and principles
- g. Is accurate and neat in work habits
- h. Does independent work in addition to the required assignments
- i. Does better than average achievement on tests
- j. Shows evidence of good preparation in daily work
- k. Meets requirements for C grade in addition to above

C Grade - Average. The pupil:

- a. Is regular in attendance
- b. Finishes assignments on time
- c. Reads with understanding, increasing both his general vocabulary and the special vocabulary of the subject
- d. Writes legibly; meets acceptable spelling standards
- e. Learns the essential facts and principles of the subject
- f. Tries conscientiously to do each assignment
- g. Listens attentively and contributes to class discussions
- h. Maintains average achievement on tests
- i. Makes up work on time if excused or absent from class



D Grade - Barely passing. The pupil:

- a. Is irregular in attendance, therefore being handicapped from lack of class work and discussion
- b. Does not try to work up to his abilities
- c. Does very little to improve
- d. Has poor work habits
- e. Learns only enough to make repetition of the subject inadvisable

F Grade - No credit given. The pupil:

- a. Does not try to do assignments
- b. Wastes time because of poor work habits
- c. Has irregular attendance and makes no effort to make up missed work
- d. No achievement on daily, periodic, and achievement tests
- e. Shows little or no improvement in course, according to ability

Inc. - Incomplete

When a pupil transfers to our school from another high school, the grades made in the school previously attended will count towards his semester average.

Reports to home:

Report cards are issued four times a year. Warning notices (Progress Reports) are sent home if a pupil is not progressing satisfactorily.

A minimum of 210 credits is required for graduation.

For achieving class status, the completion of the following shall be required.

Freshman:	Eighth grade	Junior:	90 credits
Sophomore:	30 credits	Senior:	150 credits

No pupil shall be permitted to transfer more than 60 hours of credit per year from another high school.

Pupils deficient in school credits may take correspondence courses from the University of California Extension Service with the approval of the Principal.

#### COLLEGE REQUIREMENTS

##### University of California (and branches) requirements:

1. Two years of mathematics (algebra and geometry)
2. Three years of English
3. Two years of a foreign language (same language)
4. One year of a laboratory science in the third or fourth year (physics, physiology, advanced biology, or chemistry)
5. One year of U. S. History
6. One additional year of mathematics, language, or laboratory science (if language, the same language as the first two years, if a new language, then two additional years are required. This is called the College "F" requirement.)
7. Elective, five units
8. An average grade of "B" is necessary in the above required subjects. An "A" will off-set a "C" for a "B" average in the required course group. "D" is not counted in any way by the University of California. The particular college that the student enters at U.C. determines any other required subjects.

Other colleges have somewhat different entrance requirements often lower than the ones asked by the University of California.

##### California State College requirements:

1. Graduation from an accredited high school
2. In the last three years of high school, seven Carnegie units of A's and B's (a Carnegie unit means a full year of a subject other than P.E. or Cadets). A semester A or B in one subject may be combined with a semester A or B in another to count as a Carnegie unit.

##### Junior College requirements:

1. Graduation from high school
2. Persons over 18 years of age who can demonstrate that they are capable of doing college level work may also be admitted.

To enter any college, it is necessary to have not only acceptable scholastic standing but also a satisfactory citizenship record. Citizenship grades represent cumulative behavior characteristics and attitudes of a student over a marking period in such things as conduct, attitude, respect for others, assuming responsibility, courtesy, punctuality, attendance, initiative, cooperation, active participation in the group, tolerance, tact. A student accumulates his citizenship grade day by day and from marking period to marking period.



## SCHOOL SERVICES

**COUNSELING:** Each class has a full time credentialed counselor to assist students with their personal, educational, and vocational problems and queries. Counseling services are available before, during, and after school hours. Pupils are encouraged to utilize the appointment sign-up sheet in the counseling office.

The counseling office contains a vocational brochure and college catalogue library for student use in securing information regarding possible future vocational objectives.

All students should feel free to consult counselors, teachers, or any member of the administrative staff regarding any specific question or problem that they may have.

The **LIBRARY** is a place for study. You are requested to refrain from disturbing others when using the facility. You may check out library books for a period of two weeks with renewal privileges if needed. One day books (overnight), such as General Science, Merchant of Venice, Myths, etc., must be returned by the second period. A fine of two cents is charged for overdue books. If overnight books are late, a fine of ten cents per day is charged. Books may be reserved by filling out the proper form. Kindly report lost books immediately.

El Camino has a full-time **NURSE**. In addition to her nursing activities, she supervises hearing and vision tests. All accidents occurring on the school grounds or during a supervised school activity should be reported to the nurse.

The **LOST AND FOUND HEADQUARTERS** is located in the Attendance Office. Any student finding an article on the campus should turn it in to the Attendance Office. After a reasonable time, all unclaimed articles will be advertised in the school bulletin and, if they are not identified and claimed, may be sold with the proceeds placed in the student welfare fund.

The **SCHOOL BULLETIN** is to be read during all second period classes. All notices to appear in the bulletin must receive prior approval from the Vice Principal's office. The notices must be processed prior to the sixth period of the preceding day. A copy of the daily bulletin will be placed on the school bulletin board for your convenience.

**TELEPHONES** are available for student use on the campus. Telephone booths are located in front of the cafeteria and girls' gym.

**TEXTBOOKS** are issued to each student at the beginning of the year with the understanding that the student will assume full responsibility. Fines are assessed at the end of the year for lost or damaged books. Write your name, the teacher's name, and the class period in pencil under the number on the inside front cover. Please put covers on all books to help preserve them.

## ATTENDANCE

1. California state law requires all boys and girls to attend school full time until 16 years of age, or the completion of high school.
2. California state law defines excused absences as follows:
  - a. Personal illness of the pupil
  - b. Personal medical or dental appointment
  - c. Death in the immediate family (not more than 3 days)
  - d. Court order, if called as a witness (not for pupil's own defense)
  - e. Such engagements as can be recognized as educational (if accompanied by a teacher)
3. Unexcused absences stamped "Not for A.D.A." are for other reasons than those listed under excused absences, but with parent's approval.
4. Truancy is absence from school without knowledge of either parents or school officials.
5. A pupil absent from school for any reason---excused, unexcused, "Not for A.D.A.", truancy, suspension, or for school activities--is expected to make up all work missed during such absences. If the work for the absence is not made up within a reasonable time, the pupil will receive zero credit for each day absent. The responsibility for getting assignments and completely making them up rests with the pupil. Approximately 2.2% of the final quarter grade is earned each day.
6. All pupils marked absent because of truancy shall:
  - a. Be expected to make up all class work missed or receive zero credit for days truant
  - b. Expect parents to be notified
  - c. Be liable for parent-administrator school conference
  - d. May be ineligible as a candidate for a student body office for the current semester
  - e. Be ineligible indefinitely to represent the school in co-curricular activities or athletic teams
  - f. Expect other penalties in keeping with the nature of the situation
7. Early Dismissal Pass: Sometimes early dismissal of a pupil is necessary because of nurse's recommendation, dental or medical appointment, etc. In these cases, except when the nurse calls home or takes the pupil home, a note from home is required before the pupil will be given an Early Dismissal Pass. When you need to leave school early, proceed as follows:
  - a. Present a note from parents to attendance secretary before the beginning of school (between 8:00 and 8:15 a.m.)
  - b. Present early dismissal pass issued by attendance secretary to teacher before leaving class. Return to Attendance Office before leaving school.
  - c. Have the early dismissal pass signed by doctor, dentist, or parent before returning to school. Return to Attendance Office where a re-admit pass will be issued. The dismissal is for the day issued only. Any further absence requires an additional note from home.
8. Noon hour off-campus pass: Emergency off-campus noon hour passes may be issued, by one of the administrators for the lunch period only, to any pupil who gives good cause as to the necessity of having to leave the campus at noon on a particular day. A special off-campus lunch pass may be arranged for by parents or guardian with the school Principal if justification can be shown that would benefit the pupil to eat lunch at home or at a restaurant. The parent or guardian must accept complete responsibility for the pupil during his or her absence from the campus. This shall include the strict compliance



with the Board of Trustees' policies and school regulations. Any violation of school policies or regulations by the pupil may void any future use of such pass.

9. Re-admission to school: A note from your parents or guardian is required from all pupils absent from school for excused and unexcused absences. Pupils absent five days or more shall present a note from home to the school nurse for approval before presenting it to the Attendance Office. Pupils absent because of truancy have technically dropped from school and should report directly to the Dean of Boys or Dean of Girls to apply for re-enrollment into school.
10. Leaving school grounds: No pupil shall be permitted to leave the school campus during school hours unless issued an early dismissal pass, emergency off-campus pass, or special lunch pass by the appropriate administrator.
11. Tardiness: All pupils are required to be in their classroom and seated when the tardy bell starts to ring. The classroom teacher handles all tardies. A tardy pupil obtains a tardy slip from the teacher, fills it out, and returns it to the classroom teacher. An unexcused tardy will reduce the pupil's citizenship grade in that class. Example: First tardy from A to A-; second tardy from A- to B+; and the same amount of reduction for each tardy. In addition, the teacher will penalize the pupil further according to the regulations prevailing in that class.
12. Passes from class: Pupils will not be excused from class except to go to the nurse's office, lavatory, counselor's office, and library on a restricted pass. Please do not request teachers to issue passes for any other reason. All passes are to be in ink with the name of one pupil only on each pass, and the pass is to be returned to the teacher who issued it.
13. Work permits: These are issued in the Vice-Principal's office and should be obtained before or after school. Requests may be made by telephone and the time arranged for obtaining the permit.
14. A pupil suspended from class by a teacher and sent to the office shall not be permitted to return to that class until the pupil has made arrangements with the teacher concerned for re-admittance at this time or until the beginning of the next semester. A parent-school conference usually follows to assure a complete understanding of all parties involved.
15. Disciplinary cases: The Registrar will handle all absences, early dismissals, and special admit slips. Flagrant cases of tardies and absences shall be referred to the Dean of Boys or the Dean of Girls.

1. In approaching a bus stop along a highway, always walk on the left-hand side of the road toward the traffic.
2. Do not stand or play on the road while waiting for the bus.
3. Be on time; the bus must keep a schedule.
4. Enter the bus in an orderly manner without crowding others.
5. Wait until the bus is completely stopped before getting on.
6. Do not extend head or arms out the window.
7. Be courteous to driver and other pupils.
8. Obey the driver as you would the teacher.
9. Remain in the space to which you are assigned.
10. See that your conversation is clean and never loud or boisterous; classroom conduct is expected except for conversation in normal tones.
11. Do not call out to passers-by.
12. Help keep the bus clean, sanitary, and orderly; don't damage it.
13. Make sure the road is clear and that the driver has given you a signal to cross the road when going or coming from the bus.
14. Cross streets only at intersections. Look both ways; walk, don't run.
15. Do not ride on the fender, running board, bumper, or try to hang on to the outside of the vehicle at any time.
16. Do not talk to the driver while the bus is in motion.
17. Do not open the windows without the driver's permission.
18. Do not leave the bus without permission from the driver except upon arrival at home or school.
19. Do not loiter in or around the bus while on school grounds.
20. Keep out of the driver's seat.
21. There is to be no smoking or use of tobacco in any form on the bus.
22. Pupils violating school bus regulations are liable for suspension or expulsion from riding the bus.
23. Do not eat food on the bus.
24. Pupils disregarding regulations will be referred to the Vice-Principal.
25. Late Buses: Obtain a late bus slip from the driver and fill in your name; present it to the Attendance Office for time and stamping; then, get to class within five minutes.
26. The school will provide transportation to pupils who do not live within walking distance of school (2 miles). Buses travel only on paved or hard surfaced roads and will stop only at designated stops. The students are under complete supervision of the bus driver at all times while riding the bus. Unless special permission is granted by the office, a student cannot ride any other bus except his own.
27. Activity buses: Anyone riding an activity bus must return on the same bus unless prior arrangements have been made, by the parents with the sponsor. The parents must contact the sponsor in person to complete the arrangements for the return trip. The penalty for breaking this rule will result in forfeiture of activity bus privileges for the remainder of the school year.
28. All buses carrying pupils to and from school will load and unload in front of the cafeteria and in the shop area.
29. All buses carrying pupils to and from athletic events will load near the gym. All pupils leaving for instructional field trips will load and unload in front of the cafeteria.



## DAMAGE TO SCHOOL PROPERTY

1. Pupils who damage school property shall be expected to pay for or replace it.
2. Street shoes are not to be used on the gymnasium floor and tennis courts except at dances.
3. There are no fees for laboratory or shop use. Pupils losing or breaking equipment, apparatus, or supplies will be required to pay for same in the Business Office.
4. All library fines, breakage assessments, property damage, and money owed to the school shall be paid before credits are transferred to another school or accepted toward graduation.
5. Any student who wilfully cuts, defaces, or otherwise injures in any way property (real estate or personal property) belonging to a school district is liable to suspension or expulsion, and the parent or guardian shall be liable for all damages so caused by such pupils. Sitting on radiators and tilting chairs are examples to school property.

## PUPIL ELIGIBILITY RULES FOR CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The following procedure for determining eligibility of pupils for extra-class activities has been adopted by the District Administration:

1. Eligibility reports are to be made every two weeks, with a period of at least one week of ineligibility plus any extra time needed to make up the deficiency.
2. The eligibility list is to include all activities where the school is being represented.
3. Those activities which demand preparation and activity, such as drama, music, etc., will have the eligibility list determined prior to the rehearsal of these activities.
4. Activities requiring team participation, where substitutes are available, will be on a bi-weekly basis.
5. Eligibility requirements include a passing grade in no less than five (5) subjects. The student must be passing P.E. to be eligible for athletics.

## STUDENT EXPENSES

Each student should realize the advantages of a STUDENT BODY CARD, and also remember that it is his responsibility as a student of El Camino High School to own one of these cards. The student body dues help to support many activities and the general budget. Each student at this school is eligible to purchase the card at a reasonable price. The STUDENT BODY CARD enables the owner to:

1. Attend all football, basketball, and other athletic events at a reduced rate of 25¢.
2. Attend all out-of-town league games at a reduced rate of 50¢.
3. Attend all San Juan Union High School District school athletic events at a reduced rate of 25¢.
4. Attend all student body dances at a reduced fee
5. Attend all after-game dances at a reduced fee
6. Receive a subscription to the El Caminian

Prices to be charged for all dances, plays, operettas, concerts, games, etc.

1. After-game dances: 25¢ with Student Body Card, 50¢ without
2. Regular 2½ hour dances: 50¢ with Student Body Card, 75¢ without
3. Operetta (3-act play, concert): 50¢ with Student Body Card, 75¢ without
4. Variety Show, special show: 75¢ with Student Body Card, \$1.00 without
5. Donkey Basketball game: \$1.00 (money making activity)
6. Football games: 25¢ with Student Body Card, \$1.00 without
7. Basketball games: 25¢ with Student Body Card, 75¢ without
8. Junior Prom or Senior Ball: Maximum of \$2.00 per couple
9. Elementary age pupils: 25¢ to all activities (children under 6 free)
10. Adults: 75¢ to all dramatic productions, musical shows, and other activities except Donkey Basketball and football games
11. Visiting pupils: 50¢ with Student Body Card, with the exception of dramatic productions and musical shows

All dances will terminate at 11:30 except for after-football game dances, Senior Ball, and Junior Prom, which will close at 12:00 midnight. All dances and other night activities will be scheduled on Friday or other approved week nights. The Principal may approve a Saturday night for a dance or activity if it is in the best interest of the school program.

POLICIES

1. Accident procedure: In case of an accident, report at once to the school nurse. If the nurse is not available, notify the office of the Vice Principal or the Principal. If a student receives a serious injury, the parents are contacted or the physician designated on the pupil's card as the family doctor is notified. If neither the parents nor the physician is available, the office will use its own judgment in obtaining medical help for the pupil. Student insurance, previously provided by the district, has been discontinued for this school year.
2. Bell system: The El Camino bell system is very much like that of many other schools. A student must be in his seat, silent, and ready to start working when the tardy bell starts to ring. Each class is approximately 55 minutes in duration, and a 30 minute lunch period is allowed.
3. Bicycle rules: Bicycle racks are situated on the campus on the north side of the boiler room between the 30 and 40 classroom wings. Students are asked to park their bikes in these racks. Care and safety precautions should be taken by students who ride their bicycles to school. Riders are to dismount at the edge of the campus and walk their bikes to the parking racks.
4. Eating: Pupils are to eat in designated areas. There shall be no eating in cars, halls, or classrooms. The cafeteria or the outdoor eating areas adjacent to it are designated areas.
5. Elective offices: A student may hold only one elective office whether it be for club, class, student body, honor society, homeroom representative, or publications. The reasons are to give more students an opportunity to hold office and to prevent our school from being controlled by "cliques". (For eligibility, regulations and procedures for candidacy, see the Student Body Constitution.)
6. Fire Drills: Details for these drills will be outlined by each teacher and posted on the classroom bulletin board.
7. Civil Defense Drills: Details will be outlined by each teacher and posted on the classroom bulletin board.
8. Hall Conduct: The key words for all traffic are "keep to the right." To keep the flow of students moving, you must always be courteous and thoughtful--keep moving--by no means stand in the middle of the hall congesting traffic. Move to your classroom and visit inside before the tardy bell rings. Resist the temptation to stop and talk to friends. Think of the good of the entire school and keep moving. Many students have a long

way to go. At intersections, keep to the right and make the proper turn. Actually, it boils down to following the regulations required in driving a car. It is rather obvious that running is out of place; the runner endangers the life and property of others. Five minutes is adequate if you keep moving to your next class. Be reasonable, talk in normal tones, don't shout or scream, and keep the halls orderly and quiet. don't eat in the halls or classrooms. Obey the orders of the Service Patrol or the monitors.

9. Cars: Decals must be displayed on windshields of all student cars that are parked on or near the campus during school hours. Special forms will be available in the Dean of Boys' office. These forms are to be filled in by students, signed by a parent, and filed in the office by all students using their own cars. Automobiles are not to be moved once they are parked. Use of any student's car can be made only with the owner's permission. Eating or sitting in cars during lunch periods is prohibited. Cars should be parked in the areas designated for student parking.
10. Initiations: When organizations plan initiations, these plans should be cleared at least a week in advance with the Vice-Principal. Please note that only activities acceptable under the Education Code--activities that could be better described as induction--are permissible. Section 16126 of the California Education Code specifically states that any form of initiation or hazing is prohibited.  
"No student or other person in attendance at any public, private, parochial, or military school, college, or other educational institution shall conspire to haze, engage in hazing or commit any act that injures, degrades, or disgraces, or tends to injure, degrade or disgrace any fellow student or person attending the institution."  
It is the responsibility of the administration to enforce this Code.
11. Lockers: Students are allowed at lockers 10 minutes before school, five minutes at the beginning and end of the lunch period, and after school. Keep your locker locked at all times and do not give your combination to anyone. Plan to take morning supplies and books before school, return them at noon and take afternoon equipment. Trips to lockers between class periods are forbidden. Lockers are issued and maintained by the Vice-Principal's office.
12. Secret organizations or societies: The California Education Code states  
"It is unlawful for any pupil enrolled in any elementary or secondary school of this State to join or become a member of any secret fraternity, sorority, or club, wholly or partially formed from the membership of pupils attending the public schools, or to take part in the organization or formation of any fraternity, sorority, or secret club. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent any pupil from joining the Order of the Native Sons of the Golden West, Native Daughters of the Golden West, Foresters of America, or any other kindred organization not directly associated with the public schools of the State."
13. Smoking and pupil conduct: El Camino High School pupils are governed by the California Education Code, the Board of Trustees policy, and the Student Body policy in regard to use of tobacco, liquor, and conduct. No pupil shall be allowed to smoke or use tobacco in any form on the school campus, in school buildings, on buses, or within two blocks of the school campus. The San



Juan Union High School District administrative policy fixes the minimum penalty for smoking on campus as follows: The first offense will result in a suspension of privileges and possibly a suspension from school. A second offense will result in a definite suspension from school for a maximum period of one week. A third offense will result in two week suspension. The Principal may suspend any pupil for smoking on or off the campus for a period of two weeks.

14. Advertising: No corporation, person or group of persons shall be permitted to use the school for advertising purposes without permission from the Principal.
15. Dances and other school functions: High school dances are for pupils, alumni and such guests as may be admitted by the faculty. Students attending must show their identification cards; alumni attending must show their alumni cards; and guests of students attending must present Dance Invitation Cards which may be obtained from the Dean of Girls. Any student may invite only a date and, with special permission, one couple from outside the school. The pupil extending the invitation shall be responsible for the conduct of his invited guests. Former pupils are not considered alumni unless they have graduated from El Camino High School. Alumni may request alumni cards from the Principal's office. Students and guests attend school dances should be aware that the doors will be closed at 10:30P.M. Anyone arriving after that time may not be admitted except by special permission of the sponsors or administrators in charge of the dance.
16. Assemblies: Pupils are required to attend assemblies unless given a written excuse by the Principal, Vice-principal, Registrar, Deans or a counselor.

#### STANDARDS TO BE MET BY ANY STUDENT WHO REPRESENTS EL CAMINO HIGH SCHOOL IN ANY CAPACITY

When students from our school follow the teams to an out-of-town athletic game, or attend a music festival, they are judged--and our school is judged--by their conduct, manners, and appearance.

Each of us should remember that all school regulations apply whether the function is on our campus or that of another school. Each of us should strive to uphold the reputation of our school and do nothing to degrade it. Some of the standards expected of students representing us are:

1. Proper conduct - Act your age; your mental and physical mannerisms should show mature judgment, level-headedness, and high integrity.
2. Good attendance - Support your school; attend the major portion of all events, show your pride, and participate as often as possible.
3. Satisfactory scholarship - Act intelligently; speak reasonably at conventions and conferences, voice a just opinion, and show forethought in action as well as in speech.
4. Good attitude - Exhibit loyal spirit; if the going is rough, better it by backing your team or the group of students who are trying to increase our reputation. Never show bad sportsmanship.
